Conversation Analysis (CA) as a method for investigating social life

"Languages, Media & Communication: Language in Education and Assessment" Constituent Theme Workshop

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This session offers a brief introduction to the basic principles of CA and its focus on social actions, and how participants understand one another's actions during interaction. I will outline the methods of CA, including our investigations of the underlying practices (competencies) of talking and reasoning in interaction through collections. It is through collections of phenomena (collections which often have a comparative dimension) that we explore, test and demonstrate that certain practices are systematic in their use and interactional consequences. I'll illustrate our methods through various examples, for instance relating to requesting. And I'll outline the ways in which CA has been applied to understanding the role of interaction in some of the core areas of social life (medicine, media, education, law etc).
